MEDICAL ALERT WHEN THE LIGHTS GO OUT

If you use medical equipment that needs electricity to run, please let us know.

The City has a Critical Needs Response Plan that allows customers with critical needs to be notified of a power outage.

A "Critical Care" customer is defined to be:

- A customer with specific medical conditions requiring uninterrupted electric service; or
- Elderly, disabled and/or home-bound customer who is at risk and requires uninterrupted electrical service to maintain their well-being.

The City will attempt to make contact with the customer or designated contact person if there is an outage to provide an estimate of how long the power is expected to be off in case other arrangements need to be considered for the customers well being. To apply, a Medical Alert Response Application must be completed. Information required includes name, address, phone number, and contact information for another person the City may contact if the critical needs resident does not answer the phone. The application also contains a section which must be completed by a physician stating the patient's medical condition and the type of life sustaining equipment used which requires continuous electric service for the health and safety of that individual.

This qualification requires an annual renewal. The information on the form may be subject to verification and additional information may be required from you or your physician.

The Medical Alert Response Application is available at City Hall or on the City's website. Completed forms may be submitted by mail or dropped off at City Hall. For more information call City Hall at (262) 723-2219.

CITY SCHEDULES OPEN BOOK, BOARD OF REVIEW

Property owners will have an opportunity to meet the City's assessor, Accurate Appraisal, LLC one-on-one during the following date and time at Open Book at City Hall in the First Floor Conference Room:

OPEN BOOK: Wednesday, April 3rd, from 2:00 to 7:00 p.m.

The Assessment Roll Book is available for viewing at City Hall during office hours. Appointments with Accurate Appraisal, LLC may be made by calling 1-800-770-3927 or at the assessor's website, www.accurateassessor.com.

If you are not satisfied with the results of Open Book, Board of Review is the next step. By following the steps outlined below you may attend Board of Review at City Hall in the Common Council Chambers:

BOARD OF REVIEW: Wednesday, May 22nd, 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

In order to attend Board of Review you need to fill out an Objection Form and

submit it to the City Clerk prior to the Board of Review. Objection forms and a Board of Review Guide for Property Owners will be available in the Clerk's Office May 1, 2019.

Business Owners:

If you no longer have taxable personal property in Elkhorn, please notify the City Clerk. If not notified, you are responsible for the taxes.

IMPORTANT PEDESTRIAN SAFETY REMINDERS



Be especially careful at intersections as failure to yield right-of-way can occur when drivers are turning onto another street and a pedestrian is in their path.

When possible, cross the street at a designated crosswalk. Always stop and look **left, right, and left again** before crossing. If a parked vehicle is blocking the view of the

street, stop at the edge line of the vehicle and look around it before entering the street.

Increase visibility at night by carrying a flashlight when walking and by wearing retro-reflective clothing that helps to highlight body movements.

It is much safer to walk on a sidewalk, but if you must walk in the street, walk facing traffic.

A REMINDER ABOUT MOWING YOUR LAWN



Just a reminder that grass clippings may not be mowed onto the sidewalk or street (City Ordinance 8.02.9). Grass clippings end up in the City's storm sewer and can clog drains causing flooding and do not comply with the Wisconsin DNR MS4 permitting requirements. Either mulch your clippings back into your lawn or bag the clippings and bring them to the Public Works building. Sometimes it is unavoidable that some clippings will get on the sidewalk or street; please clean up the clippings afterwards.

PLANNING A GARAGE SALE THIS SUMMER?

Garage/Rummage Sales are a great way of cleaning house while making a little extra money for your family. Please be aware that the Elkhorn Municipal Code has established a few specific regulations for garage sales to ensure that they do not pose any problems or inconveniences for your neighbors. Following are those regulations.

How often can I hold a rummage sale at my home?

The Elkhorn Municipal Code permits rummage/garage/yard sales provided no sale continues more than 3 days or parts of days consecutively. Further, no more than 3 days, such sales are permitted by any individual or upon any premises within any calendar year. Sale items may not be displayed or sold in the public right-of-way, such as on a sidewalk.

What kind of things can I sell?

Just about anything around your house that you no longer have room or use for. Just remember that anything you sell shall consist of the sale of personal property by private citizens from your own residence.

Can I post signs to advertise my rummage sale?

Sure. Signs may be posted on other people's property, but only with their written permission. For signs in the public right-of-way, the City's Municipal Code has the following requirements:

Do not attach garages sale signs to utility poles or traffic signs.

Each sign may be no larger than 2 square feet in area.

Signs placed in the public right-ofway shall require the consent of the neighboring property owners or tenants. Do not place the sign so that it will cause a physical or visual obstruction or pose a safety hazard to the public.

The sign may not be placed in public rights-of-way further than 500' from the site of the garage sale.


Signs placed in the public right-ofway shall have the address of the site of the garage sale and the name of the person placing the sign on the back of the signs.

Remove the signs within 24 hours after the conclusion of the event.

SPRING BRUSH COLLECTION SCHEDULE

Brush Collection during all weeks begins on Tuesday



*Do NOT combine leaves with brush

*Place cut ends facing direction traveling on street

*Maximum length-12 feet; maximum diameter-6 inches

The public works crew will begin the route on Tuesday morning and will pick up your properly disposed of brush sometime during your scheduled week. Please do not place brush out after the crew has gone by, they will only go through the route once during the week. If you hire a contractor for tree work, the contractor must take all debris. Parked cars must not block brush piles.

<u>Special Collection</u>. The City's DPW crew may be requested to return to a property to chip brush if chipping goes beyond the homeowner's normal pruning or trimming during the brush collection season. If additional chipping is required, then a charge will be invoiced to the property owner and due immediately. The DPW office may be contacted at 723-2223 for fees but only during the Spring Brush Collection season that ends the week of June 25th.

SPRING LEAF COLLECTION

ENDS: Friday, April 19th

Advanced Disposal, the City's refuse/recycling contractor, conducts this leaf collection. The City is divided into 5 colored sections during the Spring Leaf Collection. Each colored section on the map will have leaf pickup on an assigned day of the week Monday through Friday (see page 6).

Leaves will only be collected during your assigned day

* Leaves should NOT be in the gutter earlier than the Saturday prior to your pickup day

BEGINS: Monday, April 8th

- * Leaves MUST be in the gutter no later than 7 a.m. of the scheduled pickup day
- * Rake leaves into the street; Advanced Disposal will pick the leaves from the gutter
- * Do NOT combine brush with leaves
- * Do NOT place leaves in bags or boxes

SEASONAL LEAF BURNING

Allowed between April 1 and May 31 without a permit, any other dates require a permit

- * Burning should occur on the resident's property at a minimum distance of 25 feet from any occupied dwelling
- * NO burning when wind is in excess of 10 miles per hour
- * Do NOT burn on streets, sidewalks, terraces or any other location within the public right-of-way
- * Burning is permitted between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.

YARD WASTE DROP-OFF SITE-CITY GARAGE

12 E. First Avenue (fenced area adjacent to N. Washington Street)


Opening date: Wednesday, April 3

Wednesdays: 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Saturdays: 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

- * Accepts leaves, vegetables and grass clippings
- * Accepts yard/garden debris and brush-including clean, woody vegetative material no greater than 3 inches in diameter
- * Tightly bundle tree limbs and branches no greater than 3 inches in diameter and 4 feet in length with twine (NO wire or nylon)
- * 30 gallon paper bags or dry cardboard boxes not larger than 3x3 feet
- * **NO** stumps, roots or shrubs with intact root balls
- * NO plastic bags!

Items to be Recycled

Have your trash and recycling out to the curb by 6:00 a.m.

Cardboard (flattened)

Clean cardboard only; broken down and flattened, and placed inside the cart.

Aluminum

Aluminum beverage cans only. No food trays, aluminum foil, etc.

Glass (bottles and jars)

No window glass, light bulbs, TV tubes, drinking glass, etc.

Tin and Bi-Metal Cans

Soup, vegetable, juice cans, etc. All cans must be rinsed out completely.

Plastic and Aseptic Containers

This includes plastic bottles with threaded caps with recycling symbol <u>1</u> <u>through 5 and 7</u>. Juice and milk cartons are also accepted. *All plastic bottles must be rinsed out completely.*

Look for 🚵 on the container.

Newspapers, Magazines, Office Paper

Glossy inserts, catalogs, mail circulars, phone books, paperback books, school papers, cereal boxes, envelopes, wrapping paper, etc.

Place your recyclables in the recycling containers provided. These containers are to be left with the residence if you move.

Please keep your recyclables separate from your other garbage and easily accessible. Keep carts at least three feet apart and away from other objects (mailboxes, light poles, etc.)

- \otimes NO MEDICAL WASTE—i.e. needles, rubber gloves, oxygen tubes, IV bags, etc.

- EMPTY or DRY PAINT CANS—these items may be placed in the standard trash containers

WHAT'S NEW AT MATHESON MEMORIAL LIBRARY?

In case you haven't heard the news- There are no fines on children's and young adult items at the library starting in January, 2019. All previous fines have also been forgiven so kids are free to use the library without fear of penalty. We encourage kids to read for fun, visit the library, and check out all the new books and other items we have. Note: we do still charge overdue fines for adult items that are returned late.

During the month of April, we will hold our annual Food for Fines all month. The library will forgive overdue fines, \$1.00 for each nonperishable food item donated (up to \$5.00), to benefit the Elkhorn Food Pantry. This offer may not be redeemed on lost items.
