#### Progress Continues on the New City Administration Building

The New City Administration building is well underway. It will house administrative services for Electric, Water & Sewer Utilities as well as general City, Public Works, Building & Zoning services. The building is well within budget and on schedule for a July 4th completion date. The building is located on Seymour Court, stop by and see your new facility.

#### Changes made to City Open Burning Ordinance

The city's ordinance, Chapter 5.17 titled *Outdoor Fires*, was updated this past winter. One of the changes made to the ordinance includes allowing campfires, by permit, 12 months of the year rather than just a portion of the year (permit applications can be obtained at City Hall). The biggest change to the ordinance is banning open burning.

Residents may **no** longer burn leaves at any time. Officials chose to coordinate the banning of leaf burning with the expansion of yard waste drop-off hours at the new public works building.

In the meantime, plan to bring a blanket or chair, family and friends, and enjoy the show!







#### SPRING BRUSH COLLECTION SCHEDULE - 2021

NOTE: Brush Collection during all weeks begins on Tuesday

Tuesday, April 6, May 4 & June 1: Northeast Section
Tuesday, April 13, May 11 & June 8: Southeast Section
Tuesday, April 20, May 18 & June 15: Southwest Section
Tuesday, April 27, May 25 & June 22: Northwest Section



#### **RESIDENT GUIDELINES:**

- \*NO vines, rakings or roots
- \*Place cut ends facing direction of traffic traveling on street
- \*Do NOT co-mingle leaves with brush
- \*Maximum Length-12 feet, Maximum Diameter 9 inches
- \*Brush should NOT be in terrace earlier than Saturday prior to collection week
- \*Brush MUST be in terrace no later than 7 am of collection week.

The public works crew will begin the route on Tuesday morning and will pick up your properly disposed of brush sometimeduring your scheduled week. Please do not place brush out after the crew has gone by, they will only go through the routeonce during the week. If you hire a contractor for tree work, the contractor must take all debris. Parked cars must not block brush piles.

#### SPRING LEAF COLLECTION - 2021

Spring Leaf Collection is scheduled to begin Monday, April 5th and ends on Friday, April 16th (a <u>2 week</u> period of time). Advanced Disposal, the City's refuse/recycling contractor, conducts this leaf collection. City is divided into 5 colored sectionsduring the Spring Leaf Collection. Each colored section on the map will have leaf pickup on an assigned day of the week M-F.Please see the DPW Leaf Collection Schedule w/colored map for your pickup posted on the City's website at <u>cityofelkhorn.org</u>

#### Leaves will only be collected during your assigned day

- \*Leaves should NOT be in the gutter earlier than Disp./WMthe Saturday prior to your pickup day
- \*Leaves MUST be in the gutter no later than 7am with leavesof the scheduled pickup day or boxes
- \*Please rake leaves into the street; Advanced will pick up the leaves from the gutter
- \*Do NOT commingle brush
- \*Do NOT place them in bags



- \*Leaves, vegetables, and grass clippings
- \*Yard/garden debris and brush-including clean, woody vegetative material no greater than 9 inches in diameter
- \*Tree limbs and branches no greater than 9 inches in diameter and 12 feet in length
- \*30 gallon paper bags or Dry cardboard boxes not larger than 3 feet x 3 feet
- \*NO stumps, roots or shrubs with intact root balls
- \*NO Plastic bags!

## Items to be Recycled

Have your trash and recycling out to the curb by 6:00 a.m.

#### Cardboard (flattened)

Clean cardboard only; broken down and flattened, and placed inside the cart.

#### **Aluminum**

Aluminum beverage cans only. No food trays, aluminum foil, etc.

#### Glass (bottles and jars)

No window glass, light bulbs, TV tubes, drinking glass, etc.

#### Tin and Bi-Metal Cans

Soup, vegetable, juice cans, etc. All cans must be rinsed out completely.

#### **Plastic and Aseptic Containers**

This includes plastic bottles with threaded caps with recycling symbol <u>1</u> through 5 and 7. Juice and milk cartons are also accepted. *All plastic bottles must be rinsed out completely.* 

Look for so on the container.

#### Newspapers, Magazines, Office Paper

Glossy inserts, catalogs, mail circulars, phone books, paperback books, school papers, cereal boxes, envelopes, wrapping paper, etc.

Place your recyclables in the recycling containers provided. These containers are to be left with the residence if you move.

Please keep your recyclables separate from your other garbage and easily accessible. Keep carts at least three feet apart and away from other objects (mailboxes, light poles, etc.)

City of Elkhorn's Recycling Collection is **every other week**, the same day as weekly trash services

- ⊗ NO MEDICAL WASTE—i.e. needles, rubber gloves, oxygen tubes, IV bags, etc.
- ⊗ NO YARD WASTE—it is illegal to landfill these items
- ⊗ NO WET PAINT or HAZARDOUS MATERIALS—contact Walworth County for disposal of these items
- EMPTY or DRY PAINT CANS—these items may be placed in the standard trash containers

#### IMPORTANT PEDESTRIAN SAFETY REMINDERS



Be especially careful at intersections as failure to yield right-of-way can occur when drivers are turning onto another street and a pedestrian is in their path.

When possible, cross the street at a designated crosswalk. Always stop and look **left, right, and left again** before crossing. If a parked vehicle is blocking the view of the street, stop at the edge line of the vehicle and look around it before entering the street.

Increase visibility at night by carrying a flashlight when walking and by wearing retro-reflective clothing that helps to highlight body movements.

It is much safer to walk on a sidewalk, but if you must walk in the street, walk facing traffic.

#### MEDICAL ALERT WHEN THE LIGHTS GO OUT

If you use medical equipment that needs electricity to run, please let us know.

The City has a Critical Needs Response Plan that allows customers with critical needs to be notified of a power outage.

A "Critical Care" customer is defined to be:

- A customer with specific medical conditions requiring uninterrupted electric service; or
- Elderly, disabled and/or home-bound customer who is at risk and requires uninterrupted electrical service to maintain their well-being.

The City will attempt to make contact with the customer or designated contact person if there is an outage to provide an estimate of how long the power is expected to be off in case other arrangements need to be considered for the customers well being.

To apply, a Medical Alert Response Application must be completed. Information required includes name, address, phone number, and contact information for another person the City may contact if the critical needs resident does not answer the phone. The application also contains a section which must be completed by a physician stating the patient's medical condition and the type of life sustaining equipment used which requires continuous electric service for the health and safety of that individual.

This qualification requires an annual renewal. The information on the form may be subject to verification and additional information may be required from you or your physician.

The Medical Alert Response Application is available at City Hall or on the City's website. Completed forms may be submitted by mail or dropped off at City Hall. For more information call City Hall at (262) 723-2219.

#### A REMINDER ABOUT MOWING YOUR LAWN



The City of Elkhorn is a permitted MS4 community as defined by the State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR). With that in mind, storm water from Elkhorn, which travels to the Rock River and Upper Fox River, is now being monitored by the WDNR. In order to stay compliant and protect the environment we maintain ordinances and policies to keep grass, dirt, branches, yard waste and garbage off the street. This prevents said debris from clogging inlets and ending up in our tributaries. We ask that you do your part and follow said polices and City ordinances as outlined within this notice and as found on our website, cityofelkhorn.org.

#### WHAT'S NEW AT MATHESON MEMORIAL LIBRARY?

During the month of April, we will hold our annual Food for Fines all month. The Friends host movie nights, authors, and work weekly to maintain the ongoing Book Store, along with many other events throughout the year like the Book & Bake Sales and Trick or Trivia. This April, Fridays with Oscar will return virtually with four Oscar-nominated best pictures and a five minute video of Katie James sharing all the juicy details of the four films and what makes them worthy of a golden statuette. The video will be recorded by staff and posted on our website and Facebook page weekly each Friday, April 2, 9, 16, and 23.

## ABOUT ADVANCED METERING IN ELKHORN

You may have heard information recently about advance meters – sometimes referred to as smart meters. Many electric and water utilities, including Elkhorn's locally owned municipal utility, are making use of this technology. Wondering what this industry shift means for you here in Elkhorn? Read on for answers to some frequently asked questions.

- **Q.** Is Elkhorn Utilities using advanced meters? A. Yes. Following several months of careful research and consideration, the Elkhorn Common Council approved a plan to transition to advanced electric and water meters. Elkhorn's not-for-profit, locally owned utility is making use of advanced metering as an important tool for the business of operating our community's electric and water systems.
- **Q.** How do advanced meters work? A. Advanced meters are a safe, secure and effective two-way communications link that will allow our utilities to provide proactive customer service, improve system reliability, and operate more efficiently.
- **Q.** Why are these new meters being installed? A. Advanced meters are an important tool for the business of operating our community's electric and water systems. They will help our utility to operate more cost-effectively and to provide more proactive and reliable service to our customers.
- **Q.** Will my utility rates go up as a result of advanced metering? A. No. Our use of advanced meters is not anticipated to have any impact on electric or water rates. In fact, this new technology will help bring important savings to our community.
- **Q.** How can advanced meters provide savings? A. Elkhorn Utilities' use of advanced meters will help us operate more cost-effectively for customers. The utility currently meters 4200 electric services and 4408 water services, and our old system requires sending workers out in trucks and on foot to complete monthly readings, conduct regular testing, and perform disconnections and reconnections for these meters. Because advanced meters allow these functions to be carried out remotely, Elkhorn Utilities' new metering system will eliminate nearly all of these expenses.

In addition, the use of advanced meters can more quickly alert us to problems that drive up costs for our utilities and our customers. We will be able to more quickly alert customers to costly water leaks. Advanced meters also allow faster detection of instances of theft and meter tampering, which are dangerous and costly for our system. In the future, advanced meter data will enable our customers to analyze their electric and water consumption. They will also take advantage of demand-response programs that will provide customers with more control over their usage and bills.

- **Q.** How will advanced meters improve my utility service? A. Advanced metering will enable our staff to provide proactive customer service. Advanced metering allows faster detection of service related problems such as electric outages, power quality issues, water leaks, and potential sources of water cross-contamination. Transitioning to the new meters also helps ensure that our electric and water systems will stay in good working order for the years to come.
- **Q.** Will my privacy be compromised? A. No. As always, our utilities take seriously our obligation to protect your privacy. That will not change with the use of advanced meters.

- **Q.** What assurance do I have that my privacy is protected? A. Utilities in our state are required to strictly protect your customer usage and billing information. Elkhorn Utilities works constantly to safeguard this data.
- Q. Will the advanced meter make it possible to know what I'm doing inside my home?
- A. No. The only information collected by an advanced meter is how much energy and water is consumed based on time of day, not how the energy or water was used. Advanced metering cannot detect the presence of people in their homes, nor can it collect information about customer's personal activities or private lives.

Simply put, the information collected by an advanced meter will be used for the same purpose as the data from the old meters: measuring consumption and preparing a bill.

**Q.** Are advanced meters safe? A. Yes. While wireless advanced meters have become the subject of considerable attention for their use of low-level radio frequencies (RF), in-depth review of the scientific literature by the World Health

Organization (WHO) confirmed that the small amount of RF energy produced by smart meters is not harmful to human health.<sup>1</sup>

In the US, the FCC establishes the requirements for use of the RF spectrum and acceptable exposure limits for the public. Elkhorn Utilities' advanced meters comply with and exceed these requirements, as well as international requirements set by global bodies.

Elkhorn Utilities takes your health and safety seriously and would never install equipment that would jeopardize our relationship with you. The well-being of our customers is our community-owned Utilities' top priority.

Q. How significant is the RF signal from an advanced meter?

A. The low level of RF emissions associated with advanced meters is far smaller than that of the other common household items.<sup>2</sup> In fact, everyday devices such as cellular phones and microwave ovens typically cause far greater RF exposure than advanced meters.<sup>3</sup> In terms of RF output, Elkhorn Utilities' advanced meters typically compare as follows to other common household wireless devises:<sup>4</sup>

Furthermore, RF exposure decreases with distance from the device. Elkhorn Utilities' advanced meters are typically installed on the exterior of a building, whereas much higher-emitting devices such as microwaves and mobile phones are often operated a few inches or a few feet from the user. In addition, while other common household devices emit RD signals far more frequently, or even constantly, Elkhorn Utilities advanced meters typically will only transmit a signal four times per day, and each transmission lasts for approximately one second.

- **Q.** What is the timeframe for Elkhorn's advanced metering initiative? A. Following several months of careful research and consideration, the Elkhorn Common Council approved a plan in this Spring to transition to the use of advanced electric and water metering. In August, the Elkhorn Common Council approved the project financing.

Elkhorn's advanced metering initiative is expected to proceed as follows:

- Fall/Winter Utility software installation and data management system testing.
- Winter Installation of new electric and Spring 2021 installation of new water meters/nodes.
- Summer 2021 electric meter installations completed.
- Fall 2022 Water meter installation completed.
- **Q.** What changes will I see when my meter is installed? A. You likely will not notice any change, but once your advanced meter is installed, your usage data will be transmitted securely and efficiently to Elkhorn Utilities.
- **Q.** What if I have questions or want more information? A. Please contact our Utilities Operations Center at 262-723-3138 and our staff will be happy to answer any questions you may have.

#### SUMP PUMP AND CLEAR WATER DISCHARGE

Please be advised that an Ordinance adjustment regarding sump pump discharge went in to effect on April 1, 2020 (Ordinance Chapter 13.4.040). Summarized adjustments are as follows:

- All sump pumps shall be connected to existing City of Elkhorn storm sewers as long as said City systems are within or near the existing parcel's frontage and out of the roadway.
- Sump pumps not connected to a City of Elkhorn system (as allowed, as noted above) may discharge over hard surfaces from April 1st to November 1st; discharge to terraced areas (grass surfaces) is permitted year round.
- If sump pump discharge is determined to create a Public Nuisance by causing freezing or slippery conditions within public right-of-way then the nuisance shall be promptly and properly abated.
- Sump pump piping from a building or home to the City's storm sewer system shall be the responsibility of the property owner, including connection to the public sewer.

In the event of a fire emergency during the winter, could firefighters find the hydrant near your home?

The City of Elkhorn encourages residents to be aware of the fire hydrants near their home and keep snow shoveled away from it during the winter season. We may not have much snowfall in the coming months, but questions brought to the Common Council raised concern. Clear a path approximately 3 feet around the hydrant. This gives the fire department room to work with this hydrant should the need arise. Please consider helping a neighbor who is elderly or has a medical condition by shoveling out a hydrant in front of their home. This act of kindness will benefit the entire neighborhood. Water is the principal agent used by the Fire Department to control and extinguish fires. Delays in locating and hooking-up to a fire hydrant can seriously hamper a fire suppression operation, raising the risk of injury and possibly resulting in additional property damage.
