A MESSAGE FROM THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR



The relatively mild weather in February has many of us thinking about spring. I know it's been a difficult winter for ice-fishing, snowmobiling, and skiing enthusiasts except for a few weeks in January when we had several snowstorms and cold weather. The Public Works Department has been pleased by the lack of winter precipitation, although the week of January 7 to January 13 was challenging when two snowstorms impacted the City within a few days.

Special thanks to the Public Works team for putting in long hours to keep the streets clear during those storms.

Before looking ahead to spring, however, there have been several important developments the past few months since my last update in the fall/winter "Civic Connection." For example, on October 23, 2023, the Common Council approved Creekside Community Development's General Development Plan for the mixed-use residential and commercial development on S. Lincoln Street. Since then Public Works Director Matthew Lindstrom, Electric Department Superintendent BZ Kayser, and City Engineer Naomi Rauch have been assisting Creekside in planning for soil and erosion control as well as the layout of the new signalized intersection at Deere Rd. and S. Lincoln St.

In other economic development news, the City received news in January that Bielinski Homes is planning on proceeding with constructing 32 condos this spring as part of the Harvest Pointe Villas Condos near Walgreens on N. Wisconsin Street. We are encouraged by the news given the shortage of new residential housing in the City. In the past few months I have met with several other residential developers about possible projects, and we are hopeful there will be more housing projects in the future.

In early January the City transitioned from using Waste Management to LRS for residential recycling and solid waste collection. The transition went relatively smoothly, and we appreciated Elkhorn residents being accommodating and patient during the transition process.

In early January the City also welcomed half a dozen new Fire Department personnel, and Assistant Chief Trent Eichmann was appointed the interim fire chief following the retirement of former Fire Chief Rod Smith in early February.

On January 31, 2024, the City received a decision from the Public Service Commission approving a water rate increase—the first increase since 2017. The new rates start March 1, 2024 and will appear on bills mailed out at the end of April. Info about the new rates was included with the bills that were distributed at the end of February. This info is also posted on the City website at www.cityofelkhorn.org/utilities/page/utility-rates. The rate increase is greatly needed due to rising operational and maintenance costs as well as infrastructure improvements.

Looking ahead this spring is going to be another busy one. The City will be moving forward with the second phase of the Centralia St. Reconstruction Project, which includes the segment of E. Centralia St. near McKenzie Lane. The City will also be upgrading the Northeast Water Treatment Plant by installing a gravity sewer line and adding a segment of watermain to prepare for future use of well #10. The City will probably be postponing the rehab of the Lakeland Water Treatment Plant to 2025 due to possible federal funding for the project, which has been delayed due to the federal budget impasse.

There are several other important infrastructure projects in development. The Fire Department will be conducting a feasibility study on the fire station in the coming months to evaluate how the facility can be rehabbed to meet the needs of the full-time service. Another infrastructure project is the rehab of the Sunset Park Band Shell. Recreation Director Karl Sorvick and Grant Writer Katie James are leading efforts to rehab the band shell in conjunction with the landmark's 100-year anniversary in 2026. Mr. Sorvick and Ms. James will be working with local charitable organizations, music groups, and other generous benefactors to help raise funds for the project.

Planning is also underway on how to use the 39.06 acres of property the City purchased from Walworth County last year on the north side of the City adjacent to the Stillwater Coffee Company and Frontida Assisted Living. Preliminary plans call for the undeveloped property to be used as a passive park with a walking trail.

In the coming months City residents will see further progress in the development of a downtown garden/park that will be located on private property but open to City residents as part of the Vibrant Spaces Grant. The new green space will be located adjacent to the Chamber of Commerce and is currently scheduled to be opened as part of the Chamber's 50-year anniversary in September.

Speaking of planning, City Clerk Lacey Reynolds and Deputy Clerk Rebeca Perez are busy preparing for the City's spring election and presidential preference vote on April 2, 2024.

As a reminder, the election will be held at the City Administration Offices from 7:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m. If you would like to verify your registration status or learn more about what's on the ballot, you can find this information at MyVote.wi.gov.

In closing, one event I have not yet covered in this update was the tragic shooting at the Sports Page Barr on Thursday, February 1, 2024. The deaths of Emerson and Gina Weingart shocked the community, and our thoughts and prayers go to their friends and families after this senseless act of violence. Although Elkhorn is a relatively safe community, the shooting shows that unfortunately no community is immune from violence. Public safety is a priority for the City, and we will continue to make it a priority. Thank you to Police Chief Joel Christensen, Confidential Secretary Theresa Boeger, and the entire Elkhorn Police Department for their professionalism and hard work following the tragedy.

- REGISTER TO VOTE ONLINE with your WI driver's license or WI ID (you must have your current address updated with the DMV).
- REGISTER BY MAIL up to 20 days before the election. You can start your voter registration form online at myvote.wi.gov. Your form must be printed, signed, and mailed or delivered, to your municipal clerk. You must always provide a Proof of Residence document when registering.
- REGISTER IN-PERSON you may register in-person in the City Clerk's office up until the Friday before the election at 5 p.m. You must always provide a proof of residence document when registering to vote.

What are the deadlines for making an absentee request?

Online and by mail: The request must be in the office of the municipal clerk no later than 5:00 pm on the 5th day preceding an election.

In-person at the clerk's office:

Each municipal clerk's office sets its own schedule for in-person absentee voting.

Note: A person cannot request an absentee ballot and leave the clerk's office with the ballot. The ballot is either voted in the clerk's office, or the clerk must mail the ballot to the elector.

If you vote absentee by mail, you will notice the certificate envelope has a new design!

In order to avoid disconnection of your service, either
pay your past due balance in full,
seek assistance or if you are eligible, set up a
Deferred Payment Agreement (DPA).

<u>Deferred Payment Agreement (DPA) Rules:</u> Residential Tenant Customers will not be eligible for a Deferred Payment Agreement (DPA) if any of the following apply.

- The residential tenant has greater than \$100 of account arrearages that are more than 90 days past due.
- The residential tenant has defaulted on a deferred payment agreement in the past 12 months.
- The residential tenant is responsible for account arrearages that were placed on any property owner's tax bill in the utility's service territory in the past 24 months.
- The residential tenant has a balance that accrued during the winter moratorium that is more than 80 days past due.

SPRING BRUSH COLLECTION SCHEDULE - 2024


NOTE: Brush Collection during all weeks begins on Tuesday

Tuesday, April 2, May 7 & June 4: Northeast Section

Tuesday, April 9, May 14 & June 11: Southeast Section

Tuesday, April 16, May 21 & June 18: Southwest Section

Tuesday, April 23, May 28 & June 25: Northwest Section



RESIDENT GUIDELINES:

- *Do **NOT** co-mingle leaves with brush.
- *Place cut ends facing direction of traveling traffic.
- *Maximum Length—12 feet, Maximum Diameter 9 inches.
- *Brush should **NOT** be in terrace earlier than Saturday prior to collection week.
- *Brush **MUST** be in terrace no later than 7 am of collection week.

The public works crew will begin the route on Tuesday morning and will pick up your properly disposed of brush sometime during your scheduled week. Please do not place brush out after the crew has gone by, they will only go through the route once during the week. **Parked cars must not block brush piles**. If you hire a contractor for tree work, **the contractor must take all debris**.

SPRING LEAF COLLECTION - 2024

Spring Leaf Collection is scheduled to begin Monday, April 1st and ends on Friday, April 12. During leaf collection schedule, rake leaves into the street at least 1-foot away from the curb to allow storm water to pass and prevent flooding. The 1-foot gap also mitigates concerns with equipment being damaged and also the curb. Do not combine brush with leaves, the City offers a separate brush collection operation. Do not include pumpkins, litter or yard waste such as flowers, garden trimmings and weeds in leaf piles. Do not place leaves in bags or boxes. Place leaves when you are able throughout the Spring and Fall leaf collection schedule. Leaf collection operations will cycle through the City systematically with a goal of clearing it weekly.

- *Rake leaves into street at least 12 in. away from curb to allow for passing storm water. Leaves will be collected from the street.
- *Do **NOT** place leaves in the street sooner than the Saturday prior to your collection week.
- *Leaves **MUST** be ready for collection no later than 7 am of the scheduled pickup day.
- * Do **NOT** combine brush with leaves or place leaves in bags or boxes.

- *Tightly bundled tree limbs and branches no greater than 9in. in diameter and 12 ft. in length. **NO wire or nylon**.
- *30 gallon paper bags or Dry cardboard boxes not larger than 3 ft. x 3 ft. **NO plastic bags.**

HERE IS SOME HELPFUL INFORMATION

The City maintains a full value assessment program through the services of Accurate Appraisal LLC. New construction and permitted improvements continue to be inspected annually. Properties are assessed using a market value analysis with necessary adjustments made to keep the assessed values at 100%. Property owners are notified prior to physical inspections being conducted and also when changes are made to their assessed value. The assessor will be available for Open Book any time from when you receive your notice through May 15, 2024.



ELKHORN WINS US DOT RURAL & TRIBAL ASSISTANCE GRANT FOR CENTRALIA PROJECT

The City of Elkhorn has been selected by the US Department of Transportation for a \$320,000 grant to assist with the design and engineering of the 2025 West Centralia Street reconstruction project. Elkhorn was 1 of only 13 rural communities selected in the nation, with a total of \$3.4 million awarded to advance vital transportation projects in underserved communities across the United States. The Build America Bureau, who is administering the program, shared in its press release that their administrators received 406 applications totaling \$127 million in funding requested from all 50 states.

Elkhorn Community Grant Writer Katie James said it was a long shot to win this grant because of its unique first-come, first-serve nature. Grant administrators opted to consider applications in the order they were received, beginning at 2:00pm CST on August 14, 2023, rather than a typical federal grant with a set due date, complicated scoring metrics, and hundreds of pages of requirements to complete. James knew the challenge wouldn't be in the five-page application, but rather the time it took to click "submit" on opening day.

"There were representatives from over 2,000 rural municipalities on the informational webinar, so I knew competition was going to be stiff." James said. She pre-wrote her application text, practiced filling out the application beforehand, and asked a coworker to double check her work when the department portal finally went live late last summer. Her submission time? "90 seconds!" James laughs. It was the second application received and fast enough to be awarded the maximum funding: \$320,000 with no local match required for the City of Elkhorn.

The Elkhorn Public Works Department is going to use those funds to assist with the upcoming West Centralia Street reconstruction and repaving, which is slated to begin next year.


Tressa Lamella




Tristan McNamara
